READINGS: SURREALISM Background: Eugen Weber, ...

Breton defined Surrealism as 'psychic automatism in its pure state, by which it is intended to express, either verbally, or in writing, or in any other way, the true functioning of thought Thought expressed in the absence of any control exerted by reason, and outside all moral and aesthetic considerations'
